ARC organized two focus groups and two surveys to get a better understanding of the needs of English speakers in Montérégie-Centre. One focus group was with active community members in the Lacolle, Clarenceville and Noyan. Another focus group was held with partners in the Montérégie administrative region. One survey was sent to the military families in Saint-Jean-sur-Richelieu and another across the Montérégie-Centre region.




Proportion of English and French speakers (FOLS) by Province, Region and MRC



# **English-Speaking Population**

Most of the English-speaking population in the MRCs covered by ARC is located in Longueuil. While the age groups are relatively balanced in Rouville, Le Haut-Richelieu and La Vallée-du-Richelieu, in Longueuil the 25-44 and 45-64 age groups are very large.


#### Age distribution of English speakers by MRC






#### English and French speakers earning less than \$20,000



#### English and French speakers earning \$50,000 or more




#### English and French speakers living under the LICO

#### Educational Attainment for English speakers by MRC




Longueuil has the highest number of English speakers with a Bachelor's degree or higher.




In the four MRCs in this profile English speakers are more likely to have a bachelor's degree than French speakers.

# Employment rate for English speakers by MRC and province




Employment rates for English speakers are slightly higher in Rouville, Haut-Richelieu and La Vallée-du-Richelieu than the province.

The unemployment rates are much higher for English speakers than they are for French speakers in all four MRCs. The same is true for the province.

A large number of English speakers in these four MRCs moved between 2016 and 2021.


The English-speaking population has a much larger percentage of migrants from outside Canada than the French-speaking population has.



A total of **30,430** English speakers have moved between 2016 and 2021 in the four MRCs of this profile.

Of these movers, **5,965** moved from outside Canada.

\*People who lived in the same residence between 2016 and 2021 are referred to as non-movers, and people who changed residences during this time are referred to as movers. This can be a move within or between municipalities, MRCs, administrative regions, provinces, or an international move.




A total of **31,435** English speakers are visible minorities in the four MRCs in Montérégie-Centre.

This accounts for **45.4%** of the total English-speaking population in this region.


The proportion of visible minorities is much higher among English speakers than French speakers.


#### Breakdown of visible minority population in Longueuil



The top three visible minority groups in the Longueuil MRC are Chinese, South Asian and Latin American.


When comparing English- and French-speaking minorities, the Black minority is the only group where the proportion is higher for French speakers.


# First official language spoken by visible minority populations in Longueuil



## Household Living Arrangements

People living alone are more vulnerable as they lack the social support that is sometimes needed for certain activities because of disability, illness or aging (Pocock, 2023).





English speakers in the Montérégie administrative region are less likely to be living alone and more likely to be living in a two-parent household than French speakers.

There is a total of 7,050 English speakers living alone in the four MRCs of this profile.

# ARC's objectives for different age groups in Montérégie-Centre



Pre-schoolers 0-5 years Encourage the development of preschoolers by fostering early literacy, preparing for school, and providing support for parents



Children 6-14 years Assist children in embracing a healthy lifestyle, building resilience and promoting a sense of belonging in school



Youth 15-24 years Support youth in bilingualism, encourage social and linguistic integration, and promote education and employment opportunities.



Adults 25-64 years


Inspire adults to volunteer and engage in community development activities, including promoting employment and educational programs, as well as supporting caregivers.



Seniors 65+ years Provide opportunities for seniors and caregivers to participate in physical, social, and cognitive activities, reducing isolation and preserving their health and independence.

# Age Groups - Children 0-14 Years


Proportion of children in the English - and French-Speaking Population

Proportion of vulnerable children in kindergarten by domain of development and mother tongue (2017)




L'Institut de la statistique du Québec developed the Quebec Survey of Child Development in Kindergarten (Enquête québécoise sur le développement des enfants à la maternelle, EQDEM[1]) as a tool to measure the development of kindergarten children.

English-speaking kindergartners are more vulnerable in all five domains and much more vulnerable overall than French-speaking kindergartners.

Rouville: 10


MRC Le Haut-Richelieu: 30 MRC La Vallée-du-Richelieu: 45

English-speaking youth are much more likely than their French-speaking peers to be unemployed.


#### Among English- and French-speaking Youth 15-24

English speakers are more likely to be between the ages of 24 and 64 than French speakers in the four MRCs above.



There is a significantly higher proportion of Frenchspeaking seniors compared to English speakers in both Montérégie and the MRCs that ARC covers. The same is true of the province.







What language do you speak on a regular basis?







6 out of 10 people felt a strong sense of community,

8 out of 10 felt that social activities were important but only 33 people stated that they participate.

10 out of 10 people felt that access to health care services and family doctors was important.

Many survey participants expressed an interest in more activities for seniors to help break social isolation, also either phone calls or visits for those who are unable to leave their homes.

Some participants suggested more multicultural events for people of all ages, to help integrate newcomers and introduce new cultures to community members.

## The Montérégie Region as a whole:

Many organizations that service the English-speaking community have grown in the past 5 years, from employees, to office spaces to an increase in clientele.

Mutual support between partners with different target populations to increase awareness of available services






# What is the Community Saying?

#### Le Haut-Richelieu



The Haut-Richelieu MRC borders the US to the south and is less densely populated than Longueuil, and Roussillon which are closer to the city of Montreal. The highest numbers of English speakers are found in Clarenceville, Noyan and Lacolle.

The highest levels of unemployment and low income, and the lowest levels of education within the MRC can also be found in these regions.<sup>1</sup>



# Summary

ARC is a key resource in the Montérégie-Centre region to help English speakers connect to the services they require, and collaborate with regional partners in developing new programs for emerging needs.

English speakers have...

- ... less vulnerable living conditions
- .... more movers from outside Canada

...than French speakers



The English-speaking community has expressed a need for:

- Better access to health care services in English
- Support in finding employment and improving French-language skills.
- More activities to help break social isolation for both those in the labour force and retirees.
- Multicultural activities for the community to connect and to create awareness of the many different cultures of the region.
